Abstract for colloquium

We are women, men, and queers. We are refugees, people with disabilities, and immigrants. We belong to social categories. But what is it to belong to a social category? What is it, for example, to be a woman or an immigrant? In Categories We Live By Ásta offers a theory of social categories, how they are constructed, and how we belong to them. In the talk she will give an overview of the book with a special attention to the notion of social construction and its use in the construction of social categories.





By 'non-ideal social ontology', we have in mind social ontology that starts with difficult, complicated cases of immediate importance to social theory, rather than starting from simplified or abstracted examples and deferring consideration of more messy phenomena. Our thinking is that just as critical philosophers of race such as Charles Mills have made a case for the importance of non-ideal political philosophy, non-ideal social ontology could play an important role in advancing emancipatory social theory.
