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PREFACE

CHESS has grown and developed during the last 15 years. In retrospect, this is quite an achievement. At a time when leading researchers in the field of health equity in other parts of Europe are struggling to keep their groups and institutes alive, and often are heavily dependent on designated resources for specific tasks or from larger European grants, CHESS has managed to expand in size and, more importantly, in terms of what we are and what we do.

With regards to education and researcher training, we have built up and refined a Master's programme in Public Health, and are also establishing and expanding our own PhD training programme, in close collaboration with the Stress Research Institute.

In terms of research, we have broadened and developed our study areas. Yet, there is more to be done. In an internal Research Positioning Exercise conducted during 2015 we asked staff members to point out key areas and issues for the future in our research field. We analysed and grouped these issues, and then compared the broader themes that emerged with the broader themes found in an analysis of our research publications. This revealed that there is certainly a large overlap between what we do now and what we believe will be important issues in the future. However, we also noted that there has been a shift in what we are working on. One example is a much stronger focus on ethnic health differences, another is health and health inequalities among children and adolescents.

However, most importantly perhaps, the Research Positioning exercise helped us identify a number of key issues and research questions that we may need to put more emphasis on from now on. These include a stronger focus on gender differences, as well as the interplay between different aspects of stratification, but also the role of individual action – health related human agency – in the link between social structures and social determinants and health among different social strata.

This means that we now have a more firm basis for future applications, but also a more common understanding of where we are and where we are going. This, I believe will serve us well in the coming years, not least since we most likely will need to develop and improve further during the coming years.

CHESS was initiated and built up as a multi-disciplinary centre, organised around the issue of how to understand and address health equity. The first years were filled with discussions around the nature of, and

relationship between, the disciplines involved - mainly sociology, psychology, epidemiology and medicine. During the years, this type of multi-disciplinarity has gradually been replaced by more collaboration and joint efforts between researchers from different disciplines, but joined under the same overarching field of Public Health Sciences. In essence, public health sciences is in itself multi-disciplinary, much like social work, so in terms of research content this development has not hampered our research. On the contrary, I would argue that our research and our internal and external collaborations have been helped by the gradual move into a common overarching disciplinary framework for CHESS. We may still be sociologists, psychologists, epidemiologists and medical doctors, but we are unified under a common umbrella of Public Health Sciences.

In my view, this development has been very helpful and positive for CHESS. It has taken place parallel to, and also propelled by, the expansion of our teaching commitments. In order to strengthen this positive development I believe we must develop further, both in terms of what we do and how we are organised. In effect, we are now performing nearly all of the duties of a full department without having the organisational stability and long-term commitment from the Faculty and university that a Department has. Therefore, I was also very pleased that the investigation on the organisation of departments and research institutes within the Faculty of Social Science took up our idea to form a new Department of Public Health Sciences, with CHESS as a core part and internal research institute. It is my firm belief that the research, teaching and researcher training that we do, and do well, would gain from that development. Whether it is possible to accomplish or not needs to be investigated thoroughly during 2016.

So, the growth and development of CHESS and our research field will continue during the coming years. Our core research questions have become more centre-field in research, at Stockholm University, but not least in the wider society. Closing the health gap within a generation is now a new long-term target for the Government, and



a Commission for Equity in Health has been set up. This proves that questions around health equity are as important as we have always known they are.

ORGANISATION AND STAFF

STAFF

Particular highlights of 2015 were that CHESS employed three new full-time professors. Viveca Östberg was promoted to Professor in Sociology with a focus on health in children and youth. CHESS also announced two calls for professorships during 2014, and in 2015, Bitte Modin was appointed Professor of Medical Sociology with particular focus on childhood social disadvantage and its implications for people's present and future health, and Mikael Rostila was appointed Professor of Public Health Science with particular focus on social epidemiology. Pekka Martikainen from University of Helsinki was also employed as guest professor.

The Director of CHESS, Professor Olle Lundberg, was appointed head of the new Swedish Commission on Equal Health. Professor Denny Vågerö joined him as one of the members of the commission.

Four PhD positions in Public Health were announced within our doctoral programme this year. Two PhD students were positioned at the Stress Research Institute and one at the Aging Research Center. Two additional PhD positions, with placement at CHESS, were announced in the autumn. The applications were evaluated and the positions were filled at the beginning of 2016. In addition to the new PhD students within our own doctoral programme, Arzu Arat, research assistant at CHESS, was admitted to the PhD programme in Medical Science at Karolinska Institutet.

In October, Karl Gauffin successfully defended his PhD thesis "Embodiment of inequality: the translation of childhood social inequality to alcohol related health inequalities later in life".

In September, Ylva B Almquist took over as Director of Studies for the master's programme, and Mikael Rostila was appointed Assistant Director in November.

STAFF ACTIVITIES

On the 25th of May, CHESS staff met at Hufvudsta Gård, for the annual staff day. The knowledge gaps in our research field, i.e. 'inequalities in health', were discussed and the day ended with a social activity and dinner.



A workshop on supervision and co-supervision of CHESS master students was held in November.

Staff meetings were scheduled every third week during the autumn and spring term. The chair position rotated between the meetings.

FINANCIAL SITUATION

Our financial situation remains stable but long-term unsecure. Two thirds of our resources are 'soft money' from research councils, and a substantial amount is from our Forte Centre grant that was granted for ten years between 2007 and 2016. This grant has been an important part of what we have considered being our core funding, and has as such provided an important stability and predictability to our economy. We have developed different strategies to gain more long-term security, but also in order to handle the short-term change that will occur in 2017 when the Forte Centre grant ends. This includes both a certain amount of saving in order to handle the short term transition, as well as a new research application strategy to handle the fact that large centre grants are no longer in fashion. In general, we believe that the recruiting of four new professors will put CHESS in a good position to keep, or even increase, our capacity to attract funding from research councils. More specifically, we envisage that a larger number of intermediate sized grants, driven by several different, but partly overlapping, researcher constellations will be a good way to replace and expand our external funding in the future. Therefore, we encourage and support work with such applications. In addition, we are of course also keen on increasing our Faculty funding further, a discussion highly related to how the future of institutes and departments at the Faculty of Social Sciences will be organised. The dialogue around long-term funding from Stockholm University and Karolinska Institutet, as well as funding agencies like Forte, will continue to be an important task for CHESS.

RESEARCH

This section presents various forms of research activities that researchers at CHESS have been involved in, both nationally and internationally, with collaborators from academia as well as from other sectors. Activities include involvement in various networks, expert groups, committees and reference groups; attending conferences both nationally and internationally, as well as hosting guest researchers.

COLLABORATIONS

NATIONAL

Researchers at CHESS have had close ties with many other research groups in various university departments and institutes in Sweden.

Many collaborations were made with researchers at STOCKHOLM UNIVERSITY. For example, at the Department of Sociology, in projects such as "Sociala nätverk, hälsa och hälsobeteenden hos unga vuxna i Sverige" and the "Life-Incon project"; at the Department of Psychology in the project "School, stress and support study" and "Sustainable leadership in a changing working life". Other collaborations have been with researchers at SOFI (Institute for Social Research): the "Level of Living Surveys" and data collection for the CILS4EU wave 4 (The Children of Immigrants Longitudinal Survey in Four European Countries); as well as with the Stress Research Institute: "Social

determinants of learning and health in the school context". Collaborations with KAROLINSKA

INSTITUTET included the Department of Public Health: "Kan socialt kapital förklara skillnader i psykisk hälsa mellan immigrantgrupper?"; the Department of

Medical Epidemiology and Biostatistics and the Department of Women's and Children's Health- PhD project; and a joint project with KI and *UPPSALA UNIVERSITY*: "Is parental separation in childhood a risk factor for depression and anxiety in adulthood?". CHESS also had collaborations with the Simsam Lab and the

Department of Sociology at *UMEÅ UNIVERSITY*: "Three worlds of trust: A longitudinal study of welfare states, life course risks, and social trust"; and several projects with researchers at *LUND UNIVERSITY*: "Att leva under osäkra villkor, det moderna livets baksida?", "The social contract, welfare systems and social capital, a perspective of social inability on population health", "Contextual effects on an individual disease risk: revisiting previous evidence with new methodological approaches", "New perspectives on the interplay between environmental factors, social issues and health". CHESS also collaborated with *DALARNA UNIVERSITY* in a project called "Adverse pregnancy outcomes in relation to mothers' country of birth".

COLLABORATIONS OUTSIDE ACADEMIA

Collaborations were made with SBU, Socialstyrelsen, Riksarkivet (collecting data from the 1930 Census), Skolinspektionen (in a reviewing project), Folkhälsomyndigheten and the construction and property development company NCC (giving seminars and participating at creative meetings etc).

INTERNATIONAL

Numerous collaborations were made with international universities, both in Europe but also worldwide. Many collaborations were made with research teams in *FINLAND*, in projects such as "The revolutionary power of compassion in business" at the University of Helsinki; "Registerbaserad forskning om det svenskspråkiga samhället i Finland" and "Marginaliserade eller privilegierade? Språkgruppsskillnader i hälsa och ohälsa i Finland" at Åbo Akademi University. Various research projects are collaborations between research teams in

different countries, for example the NORDIC project, "Coming of Age in Exile (CAGE)" where teams in Sweden (CHESS, University of Gothenburg), Denmark (Danish Research Centre for Migration), Finland (Institute of Migration) and Norway (Telemark University

College and Norwegian Centre for Violence and Traumatic Stress Studies) work together. Another Nordic research project is "Mental health in adolescence and the paths ahead- An ecological life course approach to mental health trajectories into adulthood" based at the Department of Public Health and Clinical Medicine at Umeå University, with



collaborators at Stockholm University (CHESS, Stress Research Institute), University of Tampere and the Finnish Institute of Occupational Health.

OTHER EUROPEAN research collaborations include Erasmus University Medical Center, Rotterdam in the EU Project "Demetriq"; with EuroHealthNet, Heinrish Heine University, Düsseldorf, UCL, London in the EU Project DRIVERS; with Bristol University and Bonn University in the project "Do early-life poverty and food shortage trigger biological and cognitive responses in four subsequent generations?"; and, Ageing trajectories of health with researchers at University College London, Kings College London and others).

OTHER INTERNATIONAL research projects include "MOCHA" (Models of Child Health Appraised): an EU project that involves Norway, Denmark, Iceland, UK, Ireland, Netherlands, Switzerland, Italy, Poland, Cyprus, USA AND AUSTRALIA; MatCH (with researchers at the University of Queensland and other Australian universities); "Uppsala Birth Cohort Multigeneration Study- UBCoS Multigen" and SINGS (with LSHTM, University of London, and the University of Queensland). Other projects include "Social inequalities of health in Sweden and BRAZIL - aspects of time and space" a collaboration between the Aging Research Center, CHESS, Dept. of Psychology at Stockholm University, Stress Research Institute, IMS/UERJ (Institute of Social Medicine) in Rio de Janeiro, Oswaldo Cruz Foundation also in Rio de Janeiro, and UFBA (Universidade Federal da Bahia) in Salvador, Brazil; as well as involvement in a study group in Rio de Janeiro in the "ELSA Brazil cohort study". Researchers at CHESS are also involved in a research project in the United States called "Educational quality, birth characteristics, scholastic and employment outcomes for two generations of Swedish children".

GUEST RESEARCHERS

CHESS had the pleasure of hosting several guest researchers. These include researchers based in Sweden: Lars Brännström from the Department of Social Work, Stockholm University; Evelina Landstedt from the Department of Public Health and Clinical Medicine, Umeå University; Anders Kassman from Ersta Sköndals högskola; and Anna Sidorchuk from Karolinska Institutet.

Other guest researchers include Pekka Martikainen from the University of Helsinki, Finland; Marrola Bernal from Escuela de Salud publica de Andalucia, Spain; Professor Gerard van den Berg from University of Mannheim, Germany; Dr Pia Pinger from the University of Bonn, Germany; Viviane Straatman from the Department of Social Medicine, State University of Rio de Janeiro, Brazil; Dr. Rosane Härter Gripe from the Oswaldo Cruz Foundation in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil; Gita Mishra and Natalie Holowko, both from the University of Queensland.

Researchers at CHESS have also had the opportunity to be guest researchers at various universities, e.g. at the University of Helsinki; at the University of Queensland; and at University College London.

IMPACT FACTOR (IF)

The Impact Factor is a measure of the frequency with which the "average article" in a journal has been cited in a particular year or period. The impact factor is useful in clarifying the significance of absolute (or total) citation frequencies and is frequently used as a proxy for the relative importance of a journal within its field

THE NORWEGIAN LIST (NVI)

This list, developed in Norway, derives from a database (https://dbh.nsd.uib.no/Publiserings kanaler/Forside), containing a list of various publishing channels that are sorted in different levels of scientificness. It is sometimes called the Norwegian List, and is used to ensure that research is published in accordance with good scientific practice. These channels are graded on a scale from 0 to 2:

- Level 0 indicates that the channel has national coverage, and that it has no scientific review process.
- Level 1 indicates that there is a channel with a peer review process and an international readership.
- Level 2 indicates that the channel is of international high-class in terms of review of published articles and books, and the publication channels should publish approximately 20% of the publications in a given field.

NETWORKS

Various networks involve topics related to CHILDREN AND EDUCATION, for instance, the Network for research in child health services, National network for research on children as next of kin, ASA AERA (American Educational Research Association), Child and Adolescent Public Health, International Network for Research on Inequalities in Child Health (INRICH), SOHDA (School as an Origin of Health Disparity and Adversity, and The Swedish Childhood Diabetes Study Group. Other networks include ESA (European SOCIOLOGICAL Association), the Network for Research on SOCIAL POLICY AND WELFARE, Swedish Sociological Association, (REPRODUCTIVE OUTCOMES AND MIGRATION: an International Research Collaboration), the Nordic Research Network on ALCOHOL's harms to others, and the Alcohol Policy Network, and the Network for METHODOLOGICAL issues in registry-based research.

EXPERT GROUPS, COMMITTEES AND REFERENCE GROUPS

HIGHER SEMINAR SERIES

The higher seminar series is a collaboration between CHESS and the Stress Research Institute. The purpose of the seminar series is to promote high quality research through opportunities to receive informed and constructive comments on research manuscripts (and research questions) in progress. PhD students in the postgraduate programme often have their half-time and final seminars at these sessions. Manuscripts are circulated one week in advance and each seminar includes two appointed commentators. Each session allows the author 10 minutes to present their work, followed by 30 minutes allotted to the commentator(s), and 20 minutes for questions and comments from the audience. As a general rule, the seminars are conducted in English. Responsible for the higher seminars are Viveca Östberg (CHESS) and Gustav Nilsonne (Stress Research Institute). The higher seminar series is held in the Stress Research Institute's lecture hall (SRI) or in the CHESS library (CHESS).

EDUCATION

MASTER'S PROGRAMME

The beginning of 2015 saw a total of 23 students (of which six were international students) enrolled in the master's programme "Population Health: Societal and Individual Perspectives". This number has varied somewhat over the courses, partly as a result of single-subject students and doctoral students enrolling in some of the courses. 17 students were enrolled at the end of the year.

A total of 9 courses were given in 2015:

- Global health: development and inequity (with Karl Gauffin and Andrea Dunlavy)
- Introduction to master thesis in public health (with Ylva B Almquist and Emma Fransson)

In the autumn of 2015, the current director of studies for the master's programme, Jenny Eklund, stepped down in favour of her position as deputy director of CHESS. Ylva B Almquist took over the responsibilities for the master's programme.

DOCTORAL EDUCATION

DOCTORAL PROGRAMME AT CHESS/SRI

CHESS is responsible for the doctoral programme in Public Health at Stockholm University, which was launched in 2013 and is administered jointly by CHESS and the Stress Research Institute. The programme focuses on perspectives on origins of health inequalities, how living and working conditions influence health over the life course, and the biopsychological mechanisms that may mediate these associations. Eight students are currently enrolled, and three new students joined the doctoral programme in 2013.

POSTGRADUATE PROGRAMME

The post-graduate programme at CHESS was launched in January 2008 through a grant from the Swedish Research Council for Health, Working Life and Welfare (Forte). The overarching purpose of the programme is to serve as a resource for PhD students by supplementing their existing researcher training from Stockholm University, Karolinska Institutet and other universities in the area of Human Society and Health. Olle Lundberg is head of the programme and Bitte Modin is the programme coordinator.

Since the programme's inception, 19 PhD students have finished the programme. As of 31 December 2015, the programme comprised of 17 doctoral students in total who were affiliated to various departments at Stockholm University and Karolinska Institutet. Four new students joined the postgraduate program in 2015 (one student at CHESS/KI, two students at the Stress Research Institute, and one student at the Aging Research Center).

Members of CHESS staff have been present in the media- on TV: Agenda and Rapport; on the RADIO: Radio Studio 1, P4, P4 Västernorrland; in NEWSPAPERS AND MAGAZINES: Dagens Nyheter, Hela Hälsingland-Hudiksvalls Tidning, Söderhamns-Kuriren, Ljusnan, Ljusdals-Posten, Akademikern, Arbetsliv, Ingenjoren, Videncenter for Arbejdsmiljø, Forte magazine, Dagens ETC, Accent Magasin, Svenska Dagbladet, Facility Management, Sydsvenska Dagbladet, Arbetarskydd, Veckans Affärer, Inrikesmagasin, Forte Magasin; and in a WEBSITE VIDEO on the Stockholm University website. Examples of subjects touched upon are "how school affects student health", "the importance of student relations for school results", "stressed teachers and the increased risk of bullying in schools", "low status in school as a risk factor for poorer health", "associations between low grades and alcohol related illness", "social vulnerability and alcohol related illness", "loneliness and health", "the office of the future", "work places of the future", and "development of sustainable and healthy offices".

CHESS had 15,915 unique visitors to the website in 2015 (up until 31 Dec), a 17.2% increase from 2014. Most visitors, 75%, were located in Sweden, 4% in the U.S., and 2.5% in the United Kingdom (the same proportions as last year). There was an average of 1,491 unique visitors per month, a 14% increase from 2014.

The most viewed page is the homepage, followed by the staff page (/about-us/staff), then education page (/education).

Out of the new users, 47% found the CHESS website through organic search (e.g. googling), 38% accessed the webpage directly, 12% used a referral link (usually through Stockholm University or KI), and 4% clicked on a link on social media (usually Facebook).

82% of visits to the website occurred on a desktop computer, 14% from a mobile phone, and 3.5% from a tablet. There was a 68% increase in mobile phone visits from 2014 (9.5% of visits in 2014 originated from a mobile phone).
