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SUITS in transition

We have now left the Asian and Middle Eastern Studies Department that we called home for six years for our new location at the Department of Economic History and International Relations. This change means that we have had to say a reluctant farewell to two members of the SUITS family, Hans Ingvar Roth and Isa Blumi, who will both continue their work in the Asian Studies department. We also say goodbye to Visiting Senior Scholar Ahmet Gürata, whose remarkably productive tenure with us ended in late 2021. Jenny White has transitioned to Professor Emerita, but will remain actively involved with the institute, and Imren Borsuk Eroglu will stay on as Visiting Researcher at SUITS. Despite these many changes, we have nevertheless been able to build new, exciting partnerships, host well attended and thoughtful digital events, and stay true to our mission of contributing to the broad and well informed understanding of Turkey and Turkish Affairs. The transition will also ensure a firmer financial footing and a guaranteed 5-year commitment to the Institute from Stockholm University.

Reflecting on 2021

In the last six months, SUITS faculty have participated actively in policy making discussions and published books, edited volumes, and articles that have been widely read and discussed, as well as given expert testimony to governments and media in Sweden and beyond. SUITS has continued the collaboration with the Swedish Institute for International Affairs (UI) with a series of joint book events, and has initiated a partnership also with SIPRI (Stockholm International Peace Research Institute), which will continue next year. We have run the Consortium for European Symposia on Turkey (CEST) and overseen the launch of a new website as well as a graduate summer school organized by the University of Duisburg-Essen in Berlin and Academy in Exile, and a symposium organized by the University l'Orientale in Naples. We have also throughout the year held our regular research seminar, put in grant applications to a range of institutions, and SUITS faculty have held the flag up high and made sure things ran smoothly despite the pandemic and our changed circumstances.

Looking forward to 2022

In early 2022 we will be hosting two book launches (more information below), as well as continuing our collaborations with UI and SIPRI. As the leader of CEST (cest-turkey.org) we will be working with the second Summer School (Vienna) and the Winter Consortium (Paris). Additionally, we are excited to host visiting scholars who will undoubtedly enrich our intellectual community. Finally, we are also pleased to announce a new postdoctoral position with specialisation in International Relations with focus on Turkish Political Economy.




