The 15th Bolin Days – three days of knowledge sharing and opportunities for collaboration

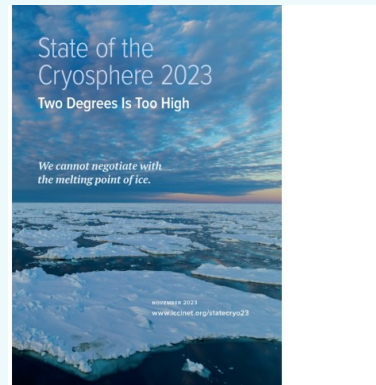
