

# Course syllabus Social Stratification, spring 2024. Department of Sociology, Stockholm University

## Course content

The course focuses on social stratification in modern societies, both descriptions and explanations.

- (a) theories of social class with empirical applications
- (b) social class mobility and inequality of educational opportunity
- (c) social stratification in other dimensions, e.g., gender, ethnicity and health.

## Intended learning outcomes

After completing this course, participants are expected to be able to:

- Understand the meaning of central concepts and theories in social stratification and class theory.
- Identify important similarities and differences among theories of social stratification.
- Understand how theories of social stratification are tested empirically.
- Account for, and analyse, the content of central classical and modern texts in social stratification in a clear and well-argued manner.
- Critically assess classical and modern sociological theories of social stratification in terms of their merits and limitations.

## Course organisation

The course comprises 10 weeks of half-time studies.

- Course participants meet on seven occasions. These occasions combine a two-hour lecture immediately followed by a one-hour seminar where the literature is discussed. Questions for discussion will be posted at Athena by the lecturer before the seminar. The students are expected to have read the literature prior to the seminar.
- Attendance is mandatory. Students who miss more than one class will have the opportunity to write a complementary assignment.

## Assessment and examination

### Examination

The course is examined based on a written exam with seven essay questions where three questions are answered in a digital on-campus exam (with the possibility to bring printed material), and four questions in the format of a take-home exam. In both formats, there is a limit of max 800 words per question.

The questions will be about central concepts, theories and important empirical findings in social stratification, and critical assessments of these in terms of their merits and limitations.

Cite the course literature using page numbers in order to build your argument (using page numbers from the course book when appropriate). Treat the lectures and the PowerPoint presentation in the same way – if you use them in your exam – cite them properly.

Note that for the on-campus exam, preregistration is mandatory and required ([student.ladok.se](http://student.ladok.se)). The student can find the room for the exam a few days before at [schema.su.se](http://schema.su.se).

### Evaluation

Ability to use the course literature in an independent way to accurately describe, critically analyze and compare concepts and theories and argue convincingly for interpretations and conclusions.

Each essay question is assessed at three levels: i) Good, ii) Acceptable (some flaws), and iii) Fail. Grades will be based on the following scale:

A = Excellent (Good on all 7 questions)

B = Very good (Good on at least 5 questions)

C = Good (Good on at least 3 questions)

D = Satisfactory (Good on at 2 questions)

E = Sufficient (Acceptable on all questions)

Fx = Insufficient (Fail on one question)

F = Fail (Fail on more than one question)

E is needed to pass the course. Students who have been graded Fx are entitled to supplement their examination. The supplement will be graded Fail or Acceptable. Students with F are entitled to do the exam again.

Students with E (or higher) are not entitled to another examination to raise their grades.

Students can request to have an examination according to this syllabus (kursplan) up to three semesters after it has stopped being valid.
