Knowledge and understanding

After completing the course the student must:

- · have knowledge of the main theories of the development of modern sociology,
- be able to understand the meaning of central concepts and theories in modern sociology,
- be able to understand similarities and differences between representatives of modern sociology,
- · know how modern sociology is influenced by classical sociology.

Skills and competencies

After completing the course, the student should:

- be able to use relevant parts of modern sociology in their own analyzes of social phenomena,
- be able to analyze the content of key texts by modern sociologists in a clear, well-formulated and well- argued way.

Values and attitudes

After completing the course, the student should be able to:

• be critical of modern sociological theory; its merits and demerits.

3. Content

The aim of the course is to provide an orientation on modern sociological theory and an in-depth knowledge of certain selected theorists and / or directions in sociology. "Modern sociological theory" refers to the period after the collapse of functionalism around 1960 and up to the 1990s. From the mid-1990s until today, sociology has developed in a number of different directions and the image of sociology today appears to be more fragmented than before. There is no longer an identifiable number of sociologists who dominate the theoretical discussion within the subject. Among the more prominent theorists during the period 1960-1995 are Pierre Bourdieu, Michel Foucault, Anthony Giddens, Erving Goffman and Jürgen Habermas. The list is completely male and reflects the current male dominance in sociology. However, this dominance has been challenged on a broad front by feminism, which in recent decades has given strong impetus to a change in sociology. Other important directions in sociology in the 80s and 90s are postmodernism and "rational choice". Of these, the first in particular has played an important role in feminism as well.

4. Mandatory exams

Attendance at teaching sessions is mandatory. In the event of absence, written supplementary assignments is required and should be submitted by the end of the course.

5. Forms of examination

Forms of examination

a. The course is examined orally through an account of the course literature and active participation in during seminars. The course is also examined through a shorter essay and a short reflection that is submitted by the end of the course.

If the course paper and any additions are not submitted on time, the reexamination opportunity will be given next semester or in connection with submission at the next course opportunity.

b. Grading takes place according to a goal-related scale including pass or fail. The written grading criteria are communicated to the students at the start of the course, at the latest.

c. Students who have received the grade fail has the right to undergo further examination as long as the course is given to achieve pass.

d. Students may request that examination in accordance with this syllabus be conducted for up to three semesters after it has ceased to apply. The request for this must be made to the director of studies.

Plagiarism, cheating, and unauthorized collaboration or use of AI

Part of your responsibility as a student is to know the rules for examination. Detailed information can be found on Stockholm University's website. Teachers are obliged to report suspected cheating and plagiarism to the Vice-Chancellor and the Disciplinary Board. Plagiarism and cheating is always a disciplinary matter and can lead to suspension. An example of plagiarism is copying a text verbatim or almost verbatim (including single sentences or lines of programming) and not indicating where it comes from. Always makesure that an acknowledgement and quotation marks are used when you submit text you did not write yourself. This even applies to texts you have written before (selfplagiarism). Cheating also includes, for example, the use of unauthorized aids, such as a mobile phone or generative AI, on a test. Having study groups together is stimulating and time-saving, but when it comes to examination assignments, you must be careful to work on your own (unless clearly stated otherwise), so as not to risk being counted as unauthorized collaboration. Generative AI, including ChatGPT, can be useful, for example in editing your own writing. However, the use of ChatGPT or similar tools in examination assignments without the examiner's explicit permission and without acknowledgement is considered cheating.

Limitations

If you have previously passed the course SO7020 eller SO7021, 7.5 credits at advanced level, or have studied a course that can be considered equivalent, you cannot be admitted to SO1FU33.

6. Form of instruction

The teaching is given in the form of brief lectures in combination with seminars on the texts in the compulsory course literature.

**Mandatory attendance **

Attendance at teaching sessions is mandatory. In the event of absence, written supplementary assignments is required and should be submitted by the end of the course.

Current bibliography is available no later than two months before the start of the course.
